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## NEWS FROM MANOR WOODS VALLEY L.N.R.

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**B**Y NOW you may have explored the flower meadow in Manor Woods Valley. We circulated M.V.C.G. members who are on e-mail to encourage people to go along and enjoy our own 'Local Springwatch'. The pale blue flax was at its best, mixed with red clover, birdsfoot trefoil and many other colourful flowers. Remember – the 'M.V.C.G. bench' paid for by the Group last year is at the top of the meadow, so well situated for contemplation or simply to have a rest. The closest entrances to go and see the meadow are Valley Road or Vale Lane.

A few weeks ago a large oak tree along the stream on the woodland side fell. It is always sad to lose an old tree like that. Hopefully it will be replaced by a young sapling.

The wall around the interceptor has been of concern to us for a while as loose slabs had been removed and taken away. The remaining slabs have now been concreted back and we are hoping that the missing ones will eventually be replaced.

Once again M.V.C.G. members and any members of the public will have the opportunity to take part in the Himalayan Balsam Big Pull. The Avon Invasive Weeds Forum Field Officer, Neil Green, has given us the details:

- Meet on Tuesday 24 June at 10.00am at the entrance behind Bishopsworth Library. Tools and bags will be provided. So will tea, coffee and baked goods. If you're staying until the finish at about 2.30pm, bring a picnic lunch.

It is always most enjoyable and fun. Also, we know that the hard work put in by many people in the past few years has been very effective in reducing the number of invasive plants. Dress for 'gardening' – long-sleeved clothing advised.

Finally, we have reported in past *Newsletters* the work done by the Avon Wildlife Trust in the old quarries area – what we are now calling 'The Malago Orchard'. All the central area was cleared of vegetation in the winter to improve the access to the fruit trees. With the damp weather we have had recently the paths have nearly disappeared. We will shortly be meeting Joe McSorley, the Avon Wildlife Trust Reserves Officer, on site to discuss the future of the quarries. If you have any suggestions to make do let us know.

## PLANNING MATTERS

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THERE HAVE BEEN THREE SITES where development has been 'pending' for a long time; now there are two (perhaps one-and-a-half!). The derelict bungalow at 104 HIGHRIDGE GREEN has received planning permission for replacement with two houses and three bungalows in a simple, modern design. This has been an eyesore for far too long, and we hope that demolition and redevelopment will happen very soon.

There is progress on the former METHODIST CHURCH HALL on Bishopsworth Road. The 'pre-app.' consultation here has been excellent, and the developer will be amending his original design to meet the planning officer's concerns and will have access to all the flats through the original front door instead of from the side.

Still completely stalled is the former U.R.C. on Church Road, Bishopsworth. Rear access from Fernsteed Road is tricky, and it looks as the owner has given up trying to find a solution – the building is now again for sale.

Elsewhere, there is slow but steady progress at Bishopsworth Swimming Pool: a 'Friends' group has been set up to look at the area surrounding the building when it is converted for skate-boarding. Let me know if you would like to be involved.

## MALAGO SPRING ARTWORK REPAIRED

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**W**E REPORTED in the last *Newsletter* that we were working with CSV Environment to get the Malago Spring Artwork repaired – the beautiful dry-stone wall had been badly damaged by too much water flowing off the hill. (See the box opposite for the history of this wonderful place).

JOE MCKENNA of CSV tells the story: We employed Phil Smith – a dry stone waller and hedge layer. His business is called *STICKS AND STONES CONSERVATION*. Phil worked on the Wraxall estate for many years until the National Trust took ownership. We also had a team of CSV volunteers who are unemployed but gaining work experience by coming out with us.

We had a large team (six plus Phil) on the first day, so we wheel-barrowed lots more stone to the site while Phil dismantled the wall with help from one or two of the lads. By end of day one we had dug out the footing, got all the stone there and started to lay the foundation stones.

The Malago Spring Artwork was the Dundry Hill Group's Millennium Project, situated at the Woodland Trust's Mannings Wood site.

Deborah Jones, an environmental artist, was commissioned by the Group and worked with local residents and children from both the rural and urban areas of the hill while creating the spring site.

This spring is a tufa depositing spring. The dissolved calcium in the water coats items in the stream such as twigs and moss. The moss near the outlet feels crispy! There are footprints carved in the stone bed of different animals that have roamed the hill since the last ice age and include prints from bears to a local walker's dog! There are also fragments of words and phrases evoking the atmosphere of the place.

The aim of the spring project was to retain the area's natural 'magic' by keeping it as a surprise to be stumbled on, enjoyed and explored. The project was made possible by the support of the Millennium Awards for All, Wessex Water, North Somerset Council and the Countryside Agency and opened in November 2001.

On day two we had a team of four plus Phil and we got most of the wall built and some very large stones lifted on to the top ready to be fixed with lime mortar the next day. We also back-filled the top with large stones to allow water to run through in case the spring should block up again.

We were rained off on Wednesday but returned on Thursday to fix the top stones with lime mortar to make them as secure as possible. We also decided to lay a small hedge along the top to try and deter people from climbing on top.

## KINGS HEAD PARK

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IT'S BEEN A POSITIVE START to the year in Kings Head Park. The Kings Head Park Group decided to plant some spring bulbs in areas around the park to brighten it up. It was decided to add to the existing daffodils putting some in 'Mavis' corner', some in the borders by the Greylands Road entrance and a group by the old children's play area/football pitch. We decided to put some crocus bulbs on the corner where the old flower beds were (by the changing rooms) and some bluebells in between the trees by Home Farm.

Julian Cox (Council) said he would find funding for half the cost if we could find the other half. We contacted local groups and had donations from Bedminster Down and Uplands Society, Highridge Forum and Highridge United Football Club, and help with planting from parents of St Peter's School and the Council provided some men. The bulbs were planted (with some tips from M.V.C.G. members) early in the spring and here are some of the results.

Unfortunately some of the bluebells were mown down by Quadron (twice) and as an apology they have agreed to sow a wildflower bank at the bottom of the children's play area – free of charge.

As the daffodils were in full bloom in March, work started on the new entrance gate at Greylands Road and a path from this entrance to the main path and entrance to the park from Kings Head Lane. The path is being well used by dog walkers, children going to school and local residents cutting through to the main road. Unfortunately there isn't enough space behind the goal post at the top end of the football pitch but this is being looked into by the Council for next season.

The group also asked for some football posts to be left up out of season for people to play football. The posts are by the changing rooms and children's play area and are being utilised regularly. Over the next few weeks we are having two new benches installed by the play area for families to use. We are also having two new bins.



So overall the park is going from strength to strength. The bowling club have applied to extend their licence and they have installed a new fence around their car park. They are also hoping to re-surface the car park in the future and re-felt the roof.
