TEAM EFFORT

N THE July Newsletter we reported the work we are _ doing to improve the entrance to Manor Woods Valley behind Bishopsworth Library. We have now painted extra panels of the fence at each end so that the whole of the path down into the Woods is now bordered by attractive, green railings, and on 15 November, we planted a row of Rosa rugosa behind railings. Our grateful thanks to those members who organised the work, ordered the plants, advised on planting, donated home-made compost etc. And thank you to everybody who gave time and energy to the project!



Watch this space in the spring!

We will carry on putting pressure on the Council to put up signs at each entrance. We hope that by the time the official designation as a Local Nature Reserve comes through, the signs will be in place. We know that Julian Cox, our Community Parks Manager, wants to get signs up, but his budget for such things is severely restricted. Perhaps we will make progress in the New Year, because we recently received a letter from Bristol Parks about their proposed 'Park Group Agreements'. This is a pilot project which would be an informal agreement between Bristol Parks and groups like M.V.C.G. on future plans and activities. We already meet Julian regularly, so in many ways this would only make 'official' what we are already doing. We shall sign up to this pilot, and we hope that it will encourage 'the powers that be' to find the necessary resources for things like signs at Manor Woods Valley.

We've kept the best news till last! Working closely with Sally Oldfield, our Local Nature Reserves Officer, M.V.C.G. applied for grant money from Yansec to carry out some major work in Manor Woods Valley. Yansec is the

organisation associated with the land-fill site at Yanley Lane which makes local grants to improve the environment in parts of North Somerset and Bristol. We recently heard that our application had been granted, to a value of £12,650! The majority of this will be spent on repairing and upgrading the footpath though the woodland, with some money for wooden finger posts pointing the way to the path, and for coppicing some of the streamside trees.

We'll be meeting Council officers early in the New Year to plan the work, and we're very grateful to Yansec for having made it possible.

PLANNING MATTERS

ARRYING ON from our reports in the last *Newsletter*, you may have seen that work has started in earnest on the Urban Splash development at the former Wills office block in Crox Bottom. At some stage, this will include draining and cleaning out the lake.

The planning application by Wring's for a stone crusher at the quarries at Manor Woods Valley is still pending. We had thought that it might be about to go to the Council's South & East Development Control Committee, but, as I write, it's not scheduled for the December meeting. More news, no doubt, in the New Year ...

We reported last time about the unauthorised demolition of the toilet block near the Elm Tree pub by the Neighbourhood & Housing Services Department of the Council. An initial exchange of e-mails petered out, and pressure of other work has meant that we haven't yet followed this up. Another thing to look forward to in the New Year!

What we tend to call 'the Matties block' - correctly described as 1-4 The Parade, Bishopsworth - is still a continuing saga, though perhaps recent developments represent at least the start of a resolution (we can hope!). Here's a reminder of the story so far: we asked the Council to take enforcement action over the lack of landscaping, but their reaction was that because not all aspects of the planning permissions had been implemented in full (even though all building work had stopped years ago and the flats were occupied), that then meant that the scheme was incomplete and enforcement action on the outstanding landscaping conditions was therefore not possible. We didn't understand this, which would seem to be a blank cheque for a ruthless developer; leave unfinished some trivial part of a permission and you can ignore all the inconvenient and costly conditions.

Although the Council had told us that enforcement wasn't possible, they began negotiations with a view to an agreed landscaping scheme and we were shown the proposed landscaping plan and invited to comment, which we did. The process was very drawn-out because, we understand, the owner was obstructive and reluctant to co-operate. We believe that a landscaping plan was agreed which was largely that on which we had commented (we were never shown a final, agreed version), and work began. Progress on the ground was very slow as well, but we and local residents were pleased to see at last the prospect of some improvement on this site in the heart of the Conservation Area opposite St Peter's Church.

When the railings were erected, it was clear that progress was *not* being made. The landscaping scheme we had seen and supported had railings at the back of the open area, not against the pavement. The owner seemed to be implementing whatever suited him with no regard to the agreement with the City Council. The height of the railings gives the impression of a cage in a zoo and has caused a great deal of concern and adverse comment in the area.

These railings, being over one metre high next to the pavement, needed planning permission, which the owner hadn't applied for. The Council *did* decide to take enforcement action about this, which we support. The owner responded by (a) appealing against the enforcement notice, and (b) putting in a retrospective planning application for the railings. We opposed the application, and it was recently refused. We have written to the Planning Inspectorate to support the Council's enforcement over the railings and to ask the Inspector to dismiss the owner's appeal. We have also described the story so far to the Inspector, pointing out that the owner has made life unnecessarily difficult not only for local residents, for M.V.C.G. and for the City Council, but also for himself.

Again, the New Year will (eventually) bring this part of the saga to a head, though the owner can still appeal against refusal of the planning permission. It's tempting to say that he wouldn't be so stupid while the other appeal is running, but, as you may have seen, he has very recently planted unauthorised conifers on the site, which we have told the Council about. It's very difficult to fathom exactly how his mind works.

- PARSON STREET-MARKSBURY ROAD: Malago dredged and cleaned out. Trees groomed and garbage removed. Entrances still need attention. 8/10

Other open spaces which in the past were strewn with Bonfire Night rubbish well into the next year are all clean and green ...
